## Fall Clean Ups 2013

The Borough will be picking up brush, curbside, this Fall.

**Brush pick up September 30th to October 7th.**

Do not place curbside prior to 9/21.

Brush placed out after 10/8 will not be picked up. Brush is to be no longer than 5' in length, butt end to the curb, 3" in diameter or less.

**Leaf pick up October 14th to November 25th. Do not place leaves curbside prior to 10/12 & not until after brush has been picked up.**

**Brush & leaves placed curbside outside of these dates will be considered in violation of Borough Ordinances.**

Note: **Landlords**– This is a notice to property owners. It is your responsibility to notify your tenants of Fall Clean up.

**And please be reminded that the Seniors Farmer's Market coupons are valid through November 30.** The purpose of the Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program is to provide locally grown fresh fruits, vegetables and herbs for the nutritional health of New Jersey's senior citizens. To be eligible, a senior must be at least sixty years old and meet the following income eligibility guidelines. For 1 person, the annual income is not to exceed \$20,665. For 2 persons, the income is not to exceed \$27,991. Each eligible senior receives a total of \$20.00 worth of vouchers for the season, to be used at participating farm markets. These vouchers cannot be used at local stores. Recipients must complete a brief program application, verify their income, residency and personally sign for vouchers received. The program will begin on [June 15](#) and the vouchers can be used through [November 30](#). ## Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water. Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it. By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty. As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.

### Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

**\* Properly use and dispose of Hazardous products \***

**\* Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides \***

**\* Clean up after your pet \***

**\* Dispose of yard waste properly \***

**\* Don't litter \***
